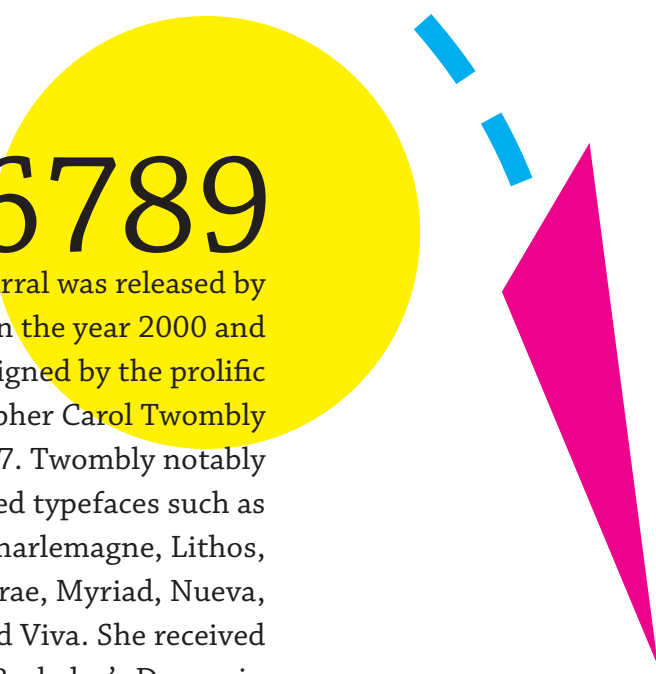

Chaparral was released by Adobe in the year 2000 and designed by the prolific typographer Carol Twombly in 1997. Twombly notably designed typefaces such as Caslon, Charlemagne, Lithos, Mirarae, Myriad, Nueva, Trajan, and Viva. She received her Bachelor's Degree in Graphic Design from the Rhode Island School of Design (RISD) and her Master's Degree in Digital Typography from Stanford University. Chaparral is clearly inspired by Roman-style type, while remaining contemporary in its slab-serif styling. Chaparral has also become well-regarded among graphic designers for its wide versatility and charm. Because of its relatively consistent thickness and expansive range of available fonts, it can be used at virtually any size without sacrificing legibility or visual interest.

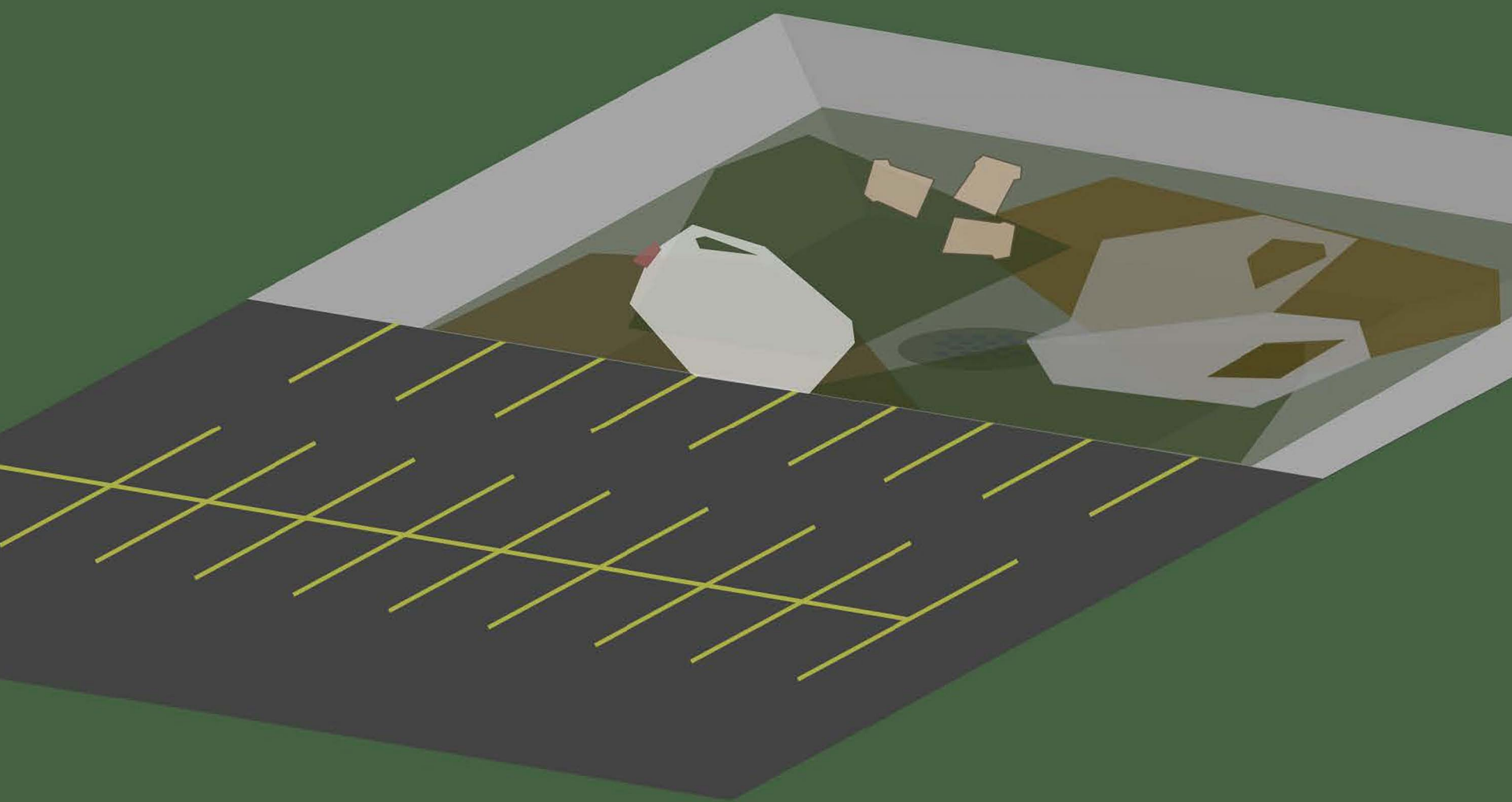

INNOVATORS IN GRAPHIC DESIGN: THREE AMERICAN GREATS

*"Good design adds value of some kind,
gives meaning, and, not incidentally, can
be sheer pleasure to behold; it respects
the viewer's sensibilities and rewards
the entrepreneur."*

PAUL RAND

(1914–1996)

(born Peretz Rosenbaum) was a well known graphic designer, best known for his corporate logo designs. He was one of the originators of the Swiss Style of graphic design in America. He was also an educator, teaching at Yale University. He designed many posters and corporate identities, including the logos for IBM, UPS and ABC.

SAUL BASS

(1920–1996)

was not only one of the great graphic designers of the mid-20th century but an undisputed master of film title design thanks to his collaborations with Alfred Hitchcock, Otto Preminger and Martin Scorsese. He is also well-known for his corporate identity work, notably: the sixth AT&T Bell System logo, the AT&T "globe" logo, and Continental Airlines' 1968 "jetstream" logo.

BRADBURY THOMPSON

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was truly a master of almost every aspect of the design profession. He was an art director for *Mademoiselle* magazine, designed books, pushed the boundaries of conventional typography and taught design at Yale University. He designed more than 60 issues of *Westvaco Inspirations* for the Westvaco Paper Corporation. His designs reached thousands of designers, printers and typographers.
